In this spirit, the RCH establishes and maintains research groups at both central and institutional levels to study topics essential to national identity.

Its mission is to bring the historically accumulated specific Hungarian experiences into the international discourse, to renew communication with the actors of the domestic and international scientific sphere, and to make humanities research accessible to the public.

The RCH's first and foremost task is to conduct internationally competitive research, and to integrate its research and results into universal science. While Hungarian humanities scholars' work must in all respects conform with the universal standards and expectations of science, universal topics should come more into focus as well.

Researchers must consider it a priority to introduce the historically accumulated unique Hungarian knowledge pool (the lessons drawn from our history, culture, and traditions) into the international discourse. Furthermore, they aim to renew communication with members of national and international academia.



The RCH conducts essential research by international standards in the **fields** of:

The **institutes** that constitute the RCH examine and interpret the entirety of the Hungarian past while reflecting on the challenges of the present. At present the Research Centre for the Humanities involves seven institutes:

Human resources

In 2019, the Research Centre for the Humanities averaged 425 employees, of which 290 were researchers. 40% of the researchers were women. 4 were regular or corresponding members of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, 27 scientists held the title of Doctor of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, and 184 had a PhD or were doctoral candidates. 29% were considered young researchers (under 35 years of age).
